A message from Mr Bull

This week we have focused on the character competency: communication. In assembly on Monday, Mr Scott introduced the word and in the context of mental health. This was followed up by an assembly on Wednesday by Mrs Ubhie which focused on the Zones of Regulation. Communication is a very important skill as being able to communicate with people is a life skill. Not only do children need to be able to learn how to communicate within an educational setting, but a big part of communication is also understanding our own emotions; how we are feeling and then communicating this in a respectful way. Zones of Regulation lessons are taught to all children in school and some children get extra support and have their own 'tool kit'. Each classroom has a Zones of Regulation station where children can go to if required. This links to our behaviour policy and ethos where we support children through kindness and expect kindness back.


