Year 4





Year 5



Year 5 have been continuing our study of Romeo and Juliet this week. We have been looking at the features of a diary entry and learning about modal verbs and relative clauses. In maths, we have continued to work on fractions, using our conversion skills to compare improper fractions and mixed numbers. In reading, we gave the children a taster of 'The War of the Worlds'. We had very exciting discussions about life on other planets! We are getting ready for our trip to the Space Centre next Friday by learning how we have day and night in science. Year 6



This week, Year 6 have been excited to explore how plants adapt to their environments in science, learning about how they survive in harsh conditions. In maths, we have continued our work on fractions, focusing on addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. The children also engaged enthusiastically with an assembly delivered by the police on online safety, which we hope will encourage them to think carefully about what they post online in the future. In computing, we have been progressing with our coding work. However, some children are still not bringing a fully charged iPad to school each day, which is impacting their learning.
