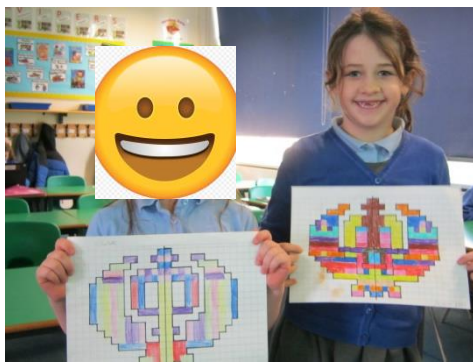
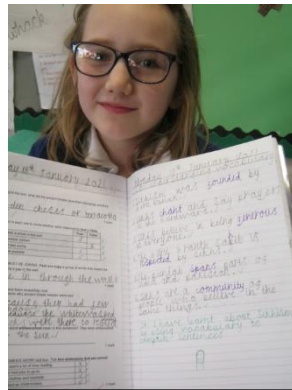

Year 3: Sikhism

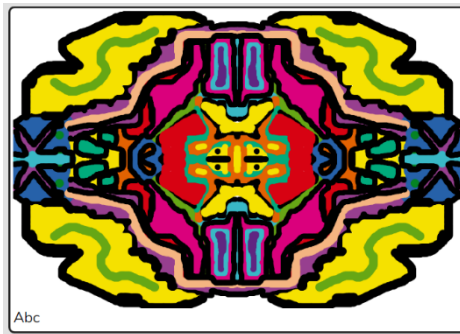


For World Religion Day we did two main activities, mirror symmetry in maths and different types of shading in art. Our maths work involved drawing and colouring in a mirror image of the main Sikh symbol the Khanda which is made up of a double edged sword, two crossed swords and the chakkar, a circle representing God. The children really enjoyed this and produced some colourful designs.

In art we used different shading techniques such as hatching, cross-hatching and toning to shade in with pencil another copy of the Khanda. We used pastels to shade in the background. Again the children very much enjoyed this activity and completed some excellent work.

We also met up with Mr Mabbutt's bubble from the Infants and shared work with each other. This was very enjoyable and some of the children got to see their younger brothers or sisters. All in all we had a great time.

Year 4: Buddhism



The children in Year 4 looked at the Buddhist faith, for our World Religion Day Celebrations. In VIPERS the children learnt about the founding of Buddhism. They read the story of the Indian Prince Siddhartha Gautama, and his journey from the palace to understand the reason for suffering in the world, which led to his enlightenment and transformation into the Buddha.

In Maths the children explored symmetry and reflections. This is because symmetry is used frequently in Buddhist art as it represents the key teachings of the Four Noble Truths and The Eighth Fold Way.

In the afternoon, the children created their own Mandalas, ta symbol of the Universe. The children chose a variety of colours to symbolize different aspects of life. To end the day the children shared their learning with Year 1 at the infants. Each child spoke with clarity and showed maturity and bravery when presenting.

Early Life
Malala was born on July 12, 1997, in Mingora, Pakistan, located in the country's Swat Valley. Her parents are Yasmin Yousofzai and Ziauddin Yousofzai. She was given her first name Malala (meaning "girl-brave") after Malala, a famous Pashtun poet and warrior woman from southern Afghanistan.

Her lower-middle-class family is Sunni Muslim and she was raised with two younger brothers, Faizal in Pashto, Urdu, and English. Malala was educated mostly by her father, who is a poet, school owner, and an educational activist himself, running a chain of private schools known as the Khushal Public Schools.

Turning Point
Known for human rights advocacy, Malala was just a young girl when she defied the Taliban in Pakistan and demanded that girls be allowed to have an education. She received a death threat and on October 9, 2012, a gunman shot Yousofzai in the head when she was traveling home from school. Amazingly, she survived the attack and continues to speak about the importance of education.

Mission and Work
Soon after her recovery, she gave a speech to the United Nations, published her first book called, *I Am Malala*, and co-founded the **MALALA FUND**, a non-profit organization. She also had an audience with Queen Elizabeth II in Buckingham Palace. After this, she spoke at Harvard University, and later she met with US President Barack Obama and his family during that meeting, she met with the Pakistani Prime Minister.



In Year 6 for our World Religion Day Celebration, we studied and created our very Islamic Calligraphy.

First we studied its origins and some famous examples like the Tughra.

Inspired by this fantastically detailed and intricate design - used by the Sultan as a signature seal - we took our own name (or letters from it) and handcrafted our own! We had some amazing and inspired artistic pieces. The children used a variety of colours, patterns, textures and techniques to pay homage to this beautiful letter art.
